

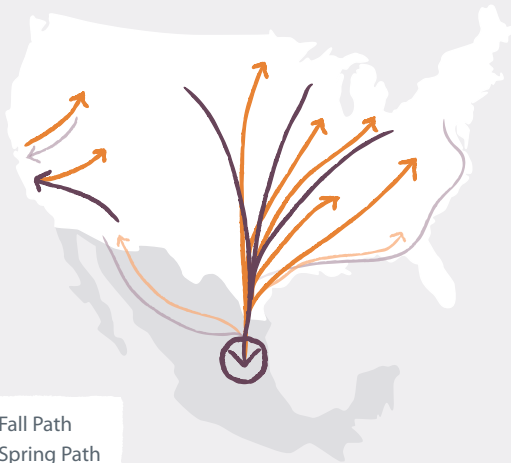


**FARMERS FOR

COLLABORATING TO SAVE THE ICONIC MONARCH BUTTERFLY

Farmers for Monarchs is a united effort by farmers, ranchers, landowners and the agriculture industry to encourage and enable the expansion and establishment of pollinator/conservation habitat, including milkweed, along the monarch butterfly seasonal migration route.

CURRENT SITUATION

Monarch butterflies face many challenges that have contributed to a significant decline in their population. More breeding habitat and food resources, including milkweed and nectar sources, across the migration route will help monarch populations recover.

Declines in the monarch population have been documented since the 1990s.

2018 - United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) begins evaluating monarch conservation measures across migration route.

2020 - USFWS determines listing the monarch under the Endangered Species Act is warranted but precluded by work on higher-priority listing actions. The monarch's status will be reviewed each year.

Monarch habitat promotes biodiversity and sustainability near productive farmlands.
